# A Few of my Favourite Things

## Music Sessions



My top suggestion for you would be to get yourself to one of the many traditional music sessions. Alas many don't even start til 10pm but it's well worth it and an experience you'll never forget. Rostrevor usually has live music at least 6 nights a week however check with the local pubs to see what they currently offer.

## Scenic Drive

One of my very favourite things to do is to meander through the Mourne Mountains. Many hike. I tend to drive. Take the back roads. Get yourself lost. Find your way again. That's the beauty of adventure. The best parts are usually unplanned

My favourite loop is to head up out of Rostrevor, past Santa's Cottage, around to Spelga Dam, and across to Newcastle. If I fancy a castle visit I pop over to Dundrum. Then follow the coast road back, perhaps stopping at Bloody Bridge for a few photos, through Kilkeel and back to Rostrevor. You could start anywhere in the loop or go the opposite direction. There are plenty of sheep and lovely stone walls along the way. Perhaps make the Carrick Cottage Cafe near Annalong a destination to aim for (I've written a wee sponsored review of them later in this guide).



## Random Finds

Keep your eyes open as you drive about. You never know what you will find. Like this potato box or an egg vending machine. Fresh produce is often available from the roadside with an honesty system.

## Narnia Trail in Kilbroney Park

Rostrevor



Narnia, the magical world created by C.S. Lewis, is said to be inspired by this area. Explore the Narnia Trail where you walk through the wardrobe door, past the beavers hut keeping your eyes peeled for Aslan, the stone table and many other parts of the stories. While in Kilbroney Park enjoy the incredible range of trees from all over the world and be sure not to miss the Fairy Glen, a quaint river walk in the middle of town.

## Poetic Action

Rostrevor

Wander around the village of Rostrevor and discover all the Poetic Action signs on various buildings. There are 37 to find and they have been described as inspiring, respectful and heart-warming. Top off your wandering with a visit to Maud's Ice Cream in The Square or visit one of our fabulous cafes.



## Kilbroney Graveyard

Rostrevor



Head up past Good Craic to the old graveyard where you will find the ruins of a 15th century church, St Bronagh's Cross (8th century) and St Bronagh's Well which is said to have a cure for eye problems. My personal favourite part is Giant Murphy's grave. He was once the tallest man in the world and lived in Killowen. Apparently the cross on his grave is the height that he was. If you want to see how you measure up to a giant pop into Good Craic Gifts. I've a life-sized portrait of Giant Murphy upstairs. You are welcome to come and take your photo with him.

## Dundrum Castle

Dundrum

This is a fabulous castle to explore. You can wander through various ruined buildings, climb the stairs to the top of the wall for an incredible view and at certain times the remaining tower is unlocked and you can go right to the top. Visiting the castle is free which is my favourite type of activity.

## Narrow Water Keep

Warrenpoint

If you like castle type buildings another fun and free one is the Narrow Water Keep, just outside Warrenpoint on the road towards Newry. It was built about 1568 to protect Newry from river based attacks although there has been a keep on this site since 1212. At certain times it is open to the public (spoiler alert: there is a murder hole inside!!) but even when it isn't it offers a great photo opportunity.

## Silent Valley Mountain Park



Another opportunity for walks with majestic scenery but also a chance to learn about the building of the dam. Walks are graded for difficulty. Some flat and scenic, others less flat but no doubt even more scenic. Open daily from 9.30am to 6pm. Entrance fee of £5 per car (or for excellent value consider an annual pass). For an even better experience download the augmented reality app: The Silent Valley Story (AR). If you are feeling energetic head up to the top dam (Ben Crom). There are loads of steps to conquer but the view is amazing and well worth the effort.

## Walk around the Castlewellan Lake

### Castlewellan

Enjoy a peaceful stroll around the lake, It is so picturesque and mostly flat. You are welcome to take your dog provided it remains on leash. While you are there why not also explore the walled garden and arboretum? Access to both is free although there is a vehicle entrance fee of £5 to get into the park. Pedestrian access is free.

## Go to the Beach

Cranfield blue flag beach, where C.S. Lewis apparently swam when on holidays, or Murlough beach, just north of Newcastle, with fabulous views of the Mourne Mountains. Both are lovely spots to visit.



## Two Minute Beach Clean

Or mountain clean. Wherever you explore why not take a few minutes to make it better? Don't forget to carry out **EVERYTHING** you take in! Love Your Lough, Mourne Heritage Trust and Newry, Mourne and Down District Council have placed these stands at strategic locations with litter pickers and bin bags. Make use of them or even take your own bag to pop litter in as you walk. We can all be part of the solution rather than adding to the problem. Please leave no trace!



# The Great Outdoors for the more energetic

## Cloughmor aka the Big Stone

Rostrevor



If you are feeling a little more energetic take a walk up to the Big Stone on the side of Slieve Martin. Legend has it the 50 tonne stone was thrown by Fionn mac Cumhaill [Finn McCool] from over on the Cooley Mountains. The views over Carlingford Lough from the stone are magnificent and well worth the dander up. Once you are up there it is easy to continue on and explore more of the Mourne on foot. Try heading for the peak of Slieve Martin!

## Evening Kayaking on Carlingford Lough

Cloughmor Extreme, Rostrevor

Try kayaking on Carlingford Lough. Sessions are held every Monday and Wednesday evening 6pm-8pm [June – Aug only, weather dependant]. For only £15pp you get all your equipment hire, some basic instruction and a safety boat out on the Lough with you. Ages 8+ welcome but children must be accompanied by an adult. Booking and prepayment is essential.

I've tested several of the activities and the staff are always very helpful in getting you kitted out with the equipment you need and giving you some basic instruction before sending you on your way. I highly recommend the stand up paddle boarding (or as I like to call it.... paddle boarding.... I didn't spend much time standing!!) The lake in Castlewelan Forest Park is the perfect place to give this a shot. Or hire a bike and pedal your way around the lake. It's only 2.5 miles and very enjoyable.

# A little Further Afield

If you have a car and some extra time I highly recommend heading in the direction of Downpatrick. There are several free historic places that are really worth visiting.

## Ballynoe Stone Circle

You get to this mystical site down a gorgeous little fairy path which I love as much as the actual stone circle. This ancient site is not fully understood by archaeologists but it is a special place. Well worth a visit. I like to think of it as Ireland's answer to Stone Henge. Highly recommended.



## Inch Abby

Most well known these days for its role in Game of Thrones but the ruins of this 12th century abbey are worth a visit in their own right. There are helpful signs about to explain what the various sections were.

## Struell Wells

This site dates back to pre- St Patrick. There are a few holy wells on the site and, again, it is well sign posted to help you understand what you are seeing. So interesting



## Saul Church

This site is known as the cradle of Christianity in Ireland. It is near the place where St Patrick landed and is said to be where he died. This sacred site continues to draw pilgrims and the culturally curious. Worship services are still held at the site and there is a lovely little prayer room beside it.

## St Patrick's grave

His grave is at the Down Cathedral in Downpatrick. There is a big stone marking the grave. Apparently this was to prevent the many pilgrims from coming to take handfuls of soil from the grave. There is also an ancient stone cross there. It's kind of interesting but probably only if you are in the area anyway.
